THE FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH EXECUTIVE COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES June 24, 2024

- I. Meeting called to order at 6:34 pm. Pastor Luke gave the opening prayer
- II. Approval of the May 29, 2024 meeting minutes: Jean Morehouse moved to approve, Pat Krehn seconded, passed.

- IV. Board Reports

A. Board of Charitable Giving - The committee is made up of Jean Morehouse, Barb Veldman, Shelli Waldo, Jack Butterick, and ex-officio Pastor Luke. The budget for 2024 is \$3000 and we have used 50% of that amount in April with donations of \$300 each to the following: Compassion House, Hygiene Bags w/Inspire Church, Newaygo County Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect (PCA), Community Closet, and Love, Inc. We will meet again in the fall to distribute the other 50% of the donations.

- B. Board of Deacons David White David is new to the EC and the Board of Deacons. Will report next month.
- C. Board of Christian Ed The Christian Ed. Board (Mat Emerick, Kelly Parks, Pastor Luke) met and talked about the structure of Sunday School. Children ages 4 Through 12 are encouraged to attend. Sunday School will consist of a story time, music, snacks, and an activity. To help facilitate, the board bought some Sunday School materials, Bible story books, and DVD's. Lou Deleguardia mentioned that

he has a 32" television that he can donate to the church for Sunday School use. Quiet bags have been put together and a schedule will be made from a list of volunteers. Will need background checks for all the volunteers.

D. Board of Trustees – John Cooper

The Trustees are in the process of cleaning out the audio-visual room in the Basement throwing out the old, obsolete equipment to create more storage room for other items. Bill Black has fixed the leaks going into the basement storage room. We have created a new timesheet for anyone working and getting paid by the church. The audit committee recommended the timesheet to keep track of who is working at the church and getting paid. May Financial Summary-May is 42% of the year. Both income and expenses are at 38%. As a result, we have not had to take as much money out of investments.

E. Women's Fellowship – Jean Morehouse

Women's Fellowship met June 5. Still waiting on the handrail. Pat talked to Gary about the railing this week. Gary will work on getting it done. Tabled a few things until the fall. I am attaching her contact information and will keep you up to date on her news.



Awareness of God - Pastor Luke

Sometimes, you say something and the full implication doesn't hit you until later. This

happened to me recently. At the last Family Night Dinner, I taught the first part of a Bible study on prayer. One of the topics we discussed was why we pray. One of the reasons I included was that prayer helps us build an awareness of God. I saw this in the research I did and thought it was correct, so I included it. But I had not thought too much about what it meant. However, it has been stuck in my head ever since. Part of what it means to grow as a Christian is to develop a greater sense and awareness of God, to see Him at work and to feel His presence. It is similar to how, as children, we often fail to appreciate all our parents did for us until much later. This ability to see and understand another is part of our growth as a person. It is the same for a child of God. We love our Heavenly Father and appreciate what He has done, but often see very little of it. As we grow, we begin to see and feel God far more regularly and in more ways. This is developed through prayer by building a relationship with God. As we begin to know Him better, we begin to see His work more readily.

The question for all of us is: do you have an awareness of God? Do you feel His presence and does He regularly come to your mind? The goal of the Christian life is to see and know God, and so often we are too wrapped up in the world to see Him. Are you doing this? Are you so distracted by life that you don't notice God at work in your life? It's easy to fall into that trap, but also easy to climb out. All we need to do is spend time in prayer.

Prepared for a purpose

Timothy Dalrymple, president and CEO of Christianity Today, was a successful Stanford gymnast with Olympic dreams. But he broke his neck before the 1996 Olympic Trials and never reached his sport's "promised land." Although the injury led to chronic pain, Dalrymple doesn't regret his pursuit or even the fall.



Even while hospitalized, he experienced "a profound assurance" of God's loving presence. "If I could know the peace of God even when my health and hopes were stripped away from me, then what did I have to fear?" he writes. "It was a liberating revelation. Since God is with us even in the valley of the shadow of death, we need fear no evil, for no evil can take God away."

In the long run, so-called failure can matter more than victory, Dalrymple learned. "The purpose of my gymnastics career was never to purchase a few shining moments of gold-medal glory but to prepare me for the rest of my life. It was never about making me a champion. It was about [shaping me into the image of Christ and] making me an instrument [for the glory of Christ and for the good of the world]."
