THE FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH EXECUTIVE COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES OCTOBER 27, 2025 DRAFT

Present: Pat Krehn – Moderator, Stacey Church – Vice Moderator, Pastor Luke Schmalz, Carrie De Mull – Clerk, Jack Butterick – Board of Charitable Giving, Bill Black – Trustees, Dean Morehouse – Men's Fellowship, Dave White – Deacons

Absent: Jack Stewart – Technology Board Non-Board Member Attendee: Gary Hooker, Judy Nadeau

- I. Meeting called to order at 6:29 pm. Pat gave the opening prayer.
- II. Approval of the September 22, 2025, meeting minutes: Jack B. motioned to approve. Dean M. seconded. Passed
- III. Public comments None

IV. Board Reports

- A. Board of Charitable Giving Jack Butterick
 - Crop Walk on October 5, 2025, raised \$1,150.
 - Hand 2 Hand collections raised 60 pounds of kid-favorite food for children in Newaygo County.
 - Noisy offering will resume for November 30 and December 28.
- B. Board of Deacons Dave White
 - New member class is going well.
 - New communion structure going well.
 - The Deacons will provide money for advertising.
- C. Board of Christian Education
 - Crystal has ordered another set of videos to show the children. It will be an animated version of The Chosen.

D. Board of Trustees – Bill Black

- 75% of the year is complete and our pledges are at 104%.
- 95% total income and expenses are 73%
- Lot sale is complete.
- •150th Anniversary plaque will be mounted outside the church on November 9. There will be an anniversary celebration wrap up luncheon on November 9th with the plaque dedication, time capsule closure, and church 150th historical presentation after worship.
- The Trustees are willing to help with advertising expenses if the need arises.
- The Trustees are working on a parking lot solution.
- The Trustees will now be responsible for giving out new key cards.

E. Women's Fellowship-Jean Morehouse

- Travelogue has been moved to the spring, late March or early April.
- Discussion about Crop Walk Spaghetti Supper: Raised a fair amount of money with very few taking part in the meal. Different day next year? Different time? Things to think about.
- Ordered 2 more banners for the Christmas Craft Sale which will be put up by the road for all of November and Keep Christ in Christmas which will be put up out by the road through December.

F. Technology Board – No Report

G. Men's Fellowship – Dean Morehouse

- 17 people attended October luncheon/meeting. John and Gail provided food. Barb Geeno was the speaker.
- Next Luncheon, November 5, at 12:00 pm. The speaker will be Bill Fries, Jr., and our chef will be Dean Morehouse.

V. Pastor's Report-Pastor Luke

- Harvest Parade table during the Harvest Parade had a good response and great outreach. It was highly successful.
- Afternoon small group has started.
- Two community connections this month. Fremont Christian School Chapel and met with True North.
- True North is starting a program called ENGAGE. True North met with pastors from area churches to see what programs they are offering to help the community. This will in turn help True North ENGAGE more with the community for those people in need.
- Chosen has started.
- ROR was this last week. It is the last one for the year.

- Finishing new members class on November 2nd after worship.
- Love, Inc. is having a leadership breakfast that I will be attending.
- Vacation is schedule for 3 days over the Thanksgiving holiday.
- Advent starts November 30.

VI. Acceptance of reports – Bill Black motioned, and Dean M. seconded to approve – passed.

VII. Old Business

- Formation of the bylaws committee. EC is tasked with this.
- After discussion, the committee members are Pastor Luke, Jim Rynberg, Judy Nadeau, Carrie DeMull, Jean Morehouse, and Pat Krehn.
- Next town hall meeting will be January 2026. Time to be decided at a later date.

VIII. New Business

- 1. In 2020, the Deacons set out to do a study of church growth. Covid hit and they couldn't move forward. A discussion started about our church growth. Judy N. And Dean M. would like to step up and help with a plan for church growth. They would like to develop and implement a plan. A motion was made by Judy Nadeau/Dean Morehouse. They moved the EC agree there is a need to grow our church and they would like the opportunity to develop a plan to do so. This will include researching other churches plans for successful growth and avenues used to promote favorable outcomes. The results will be present to the EC as soon as possible. Jack B. seconded. 9 all in favor . Approved.
- Advertising discussion along with growing the church. Deacons have money in their budget for advertising. Advertising will be charged to the Deacons.
- EC can use Dean Morehouse's expertise in this area with his ties to the community.
- Wintertime is a perfect time to advertise the Crafters and the Workshop and what they are doing for the church and the community.
- 2. Gary Hooker came and talked to the EC about the security and safety of the Church.
- Gary said that there should be 4 people per service to walk around the building and secure the building after the services have started.
- He would like to form a Security and Safety Committee. It would be a ministry for the congregation. A discussion was started and a few areas of concern were brought forward. When Rooms of Refuge is here, the door is left open. Is this safe for the church and the guests staying with us? Also, 15 minutes after the service starts, the doors are locked.

- Bill Black brought up the concern with a lot of people having keys to the church. Lorene will look at the members/friends that have keys and talk with the trustees. We need to balance safety with also being welcoming. Could there be a few action steps taken such as a doorbell to let people in, 4 committee members making rounds to make sure the doors are locked (15 minuted window as mentioned above). Members need to make sure their key is on them in case they are late.
- More discussion followed, and the EC decided to talk about this further and have Gary come back next months to talk some more.
- 3. Rooms of Refuge dates for 2026. February 26-March 2, May 25-June 1, August 17-24, and November 16-23. Luke made a motion to have ROR use the church in 2026. Dean M. seconded. Passed.


Meeting adjourned at 8:30 PM

Coated or uncoated nuts

Dried pasta made with eggs

Roasted coffee beans or ground roasted coffee

All food items have to be labeled with a list of ingredients with your FIRST name, The First Congregational Church 231-924-4710 on the label.




Women's Bible Study

What Can God Do With The Heart, Mind, and Hands of Many During this Season of Uncertainty? -Crystal Schmalz

This article is a mixture of personal reflection, sharing, and ends with a personal call to action. I am going to share these reflections in three sub-topics: personal, community, and church. I want to share what is on my heart, in my mind, and what I might be able to do with my hands. I pray it blesses you. I offer it with humility, a few tears, and a small bit of courage.

Personal

and with all your MIND I am personally grateful for the many blessings of God, and for how God has always helped provide for needs within my family. I am reminded of many times in childhood when my family had times of needs, and God provided through the church and community for these needs. Whether it was receiving food stamps, riding the city buses, receiving food from a food bank, getting a winter coat or new pair of boots, or my parents working tirelessly to provide for our family, I am reminded of the goodness of God, the Church, and the Community. Our family life would have been far more challenging without the help of many. I'll never forget the time a woman in the church shared her daughters used dresses with me, and how I felt like a princess in the dresses. I will not forget the man who drove the church bus, and picked us up on Sundays because we did not always have a car. I will not forget the ministry leader who gave my mom a turkey, not knowing we had very little for the Thanksgiving Holiday. I will be forever grateful for these generous God-led hearts. You may not know how far and wide your generosity reaches, and only the stories of eternity will share the full picture of your importance, impact, and ministry. You do make a difference, and I hope you never question or forget that.

Community

Some of you may know I serve as a leader within Trinity Health. In this role, I was fortunate to sit at a meeting of leaders who are asking how they can help mobilize charitable food efforts in Muskegon, Oceana, and Ottawa counties. The need has always existed, but with the government shut down the needs have grown exponentially. There are many within Newaygo County and beyond who may need extra help during this season of uncertainty. There is danger of grocery stores closing, people going hungry, lights being shut off, and many experiencing homelessness. While the needs may feel overwhelming and great, we can do something. There are a few ways we can help as a church and community. The United Way is establishing funds to help further the cause of food distribution for at risk families. They can stretch a dollar in a way that often we cannot, and one of the best ways to help is to donate to United Way and or Feeding America. A second way we can help, is to let people know they can call 211 and receive information about assistance. 211 is a program which helps connect people to critical resources. A third way we can help is to donate to local already established food

pantries in our area. These pantries often have established hours of distribution, and you can let people know they can go online to the Feeding America website and look up a food map, which gives an updated list of local food pantries in the area with times, locations, and services provided. Another way we can help is to become a volunteer at a local food pantry and donate our time. True North and Love Inc. have established programs and may need an extra hand in the weeks and months to come. There may also be other churches in the area which could use a few lending hands in their food pantry efforts. I am grateful we have an Ecumenical vision here in our church, and we can work together with other Christian leaders.

Church

First Congregational Church of Fremont is one of the most generous and community-giving churches I have ever encountered. I want you to know the work, ministry, and care you give each day is making a difference. From your work on the Board of Charitable Giving, to the Wood Shop projects, to the Women's Fellowship initiatives, to visiting people in their homes or bringing a meal to someone, to your commitment to helping Rooms of Refuge you are sharing the love of Christ. You are demonstrating the incarnational ministry of God, and following the Biblical call to care for the poor.

As I think about the poor, I am reminded of how the poor are defined within scripture. The poor are the brokenhearted. The poor are the ones who grieve and mourn. The poor are the children and marginalized. The poor are those who are overlooked or unwelcome in society. The poor are those who are struggling. Jesus said the poor will always be with us, and this lets me know I have both a responsibility and a calling to be committed to walking with the poor if I want to be a minister of the Gospel. I do not take this calling lightly, and especially in this season of uncertainty I want to be led by the Holy Spirit to help those I see in need. I want to be able to share a meal with a struggling family (two are in Pastor's office if you know of someone in need-including a turkey), buy a bag of diapers to give to a struggling parent, hold the hand of someone who is dying, say a prayer with someone who needs God's miraculous touch, sit with children in Sunday School and teach them about the love of God not only through words, but with my actions, and care for ministry leaders who are caring for others. Sometimes the best sermons are those with which only a few words are spoken, but many actions are shared. My personal call to action is to ask God for the strength to increase my ability to demonstrate the love of Christ to my neighbors. Neighbors being defined as anyone who I come in contact with, whether they share my beliefs or not. I also want to ask you to think about what your personal call to action might be. The Holy Spirit empowers us to give, and inspires our hearts and hands to love. May God's Holy Spirit both hold you for the care and work you already give, and may the Holy Spirit also stir your heart for any ways you might be able to extend or stretch your ministry, which is vitally important. If you have a need, please let Pastor and I know. We want to be able to care for you and are not always aware of all the needs. We will join you in prayer. We will walk with you in suffering. We will try our best to care for you and share the love of Jesus with your heart, mind, soul, and strength.
